Naming The Club

The idea behind the name Sankaku came from a special technique found in the kata Meikyo. The 'Sankaku Tobi' or 'Triangular Jump' enables a combatant to escape from a precarious position such as the edge of a cliff to an advantageous point behind his adversary.

- a) On the physical level, the 3 facets (sometimes called the Trinity) of Shotokan Karate training Kihon (Basics), Kata (Forms) and Kumite (Sparring) resulting in controlled power like that of the 'contained tiger' in the Shotokan emblem,
- b) On the mental/psychological level, 3 important virtues from the Bushido Code (which contained 8 virtues of the Samurai class) that are still relevant to karateka of today Ei yo (Honour), Kokki (Character & Self-Control), Yuki (Courage to do what is right), and
- c) On the philosophical level, 3 other virtues from the Bushido Code fundamental to the concept of 'Do' in Karate-Do Gi (Rectitude or Justice considered the strongest virtue of Bushido), Seijitsu & Shinjitsu (Honesty & Sincerity) and Jin (Benevolence considered the highest attribute of the human soul).

Designing The Logo



The three elements in the logo consist of

- a) The Sankaku/Triangle representing the art of Shotokan (Kihon, Kata and Kumite) as a 3 corner form.
- b) The Shotokan Tiger. Master Gichin Funakoshi chose the tiger as the animal symbol to represent Shotokan. It signified strength, power, and tenacity.
- c) The Club Name in Kanji.
